


Centennial Plaza

HISTORICAL TRIBUTE



The Hotel Noble was a gathering place once located at the corner of Jackson and Union. It hosted the Rotary Club of Jonesboro from its inception in 1919 through the 1950s. A replica of the entrance to the hotel pays homage to the long history of service and community engagement the club has maintained for the past 100 years.



On August I, 1919, twenty-five young businessmen met at the Hotel Noble to form the world's 520th Rotary Club. They adopted the purpose of Rotary: to foster friendships, enhance business contacts and make a difference in their community and the world.

The story of the Rotary Club of Jonesboro mirrors the needs of the community and reflects our decades of service. Throughout its early years the club participated in war time efforts, established the area's first Babe Ruth League field, funded a Student Loan Foundation and helped build a Youth Shelter Home (now Consolidated Youth Services).

For the past thirty years the Rotary's Arkansas Sportshow has generated over 1.5 million dollars for services and projects for children, youth and adults locally and worldwide. Examples include literacy and backpack projects in area schools, Christmas projects for foster children, Shop with a Cop, and college scholarships. We have addressed hunger and health issues. The club has partnered with other Rotary Clubs and the city to create Centennial Park and Fort Rotary at Craighead Forest Park. We joined Rotary International to rid the world of Polio. The projects have varied, but the purpose has remained consistent: to identify the needs of our community and to meet those needs to the best of our ability.

The Rotary Club of Jonesboro will celebrate 100 years of service in 2019. As "People of Action" we have chosen "Centennial Plaza" as our gift to the community in celebration of our birthday. We invite you to join us in this impactful downtown revitalization effort.
