Summary

- No deaths; 22 injuries
- Property damage: Est. \$500 mil.
- Quick response on mobilization
 Police, Fire, Streets, Code, Inspection, Sanitation, JET, Parks, Planning, Animal Control, County Roads, ARDOT, County OEM, others.
- Significant assistance provided by volunteers.
 - Recovery, cleanup, money, supplies.



Turtle Creek Mall

•Owner:

- Brookfield Properties, Chicago
- "We are reviewing the best options for the shopping center and community going forward. Due to the global pandemic, our timeline will be extended as we navigate this unprecedented situation."
- 63 businesses affected.
 - Undetermined status for several smaller stores.
- Re-opened:
 - Mall: Dillards, JC Penney*, Target
 - Relocated: Hibbett Sports, Gamble, Buckle, others.
- Undetermined:
 - Best Buy, Barnes and Noble





Train derailment

•35 rail cars overturned.

Three 275 gallon tanks of flammable liquid (UN 1993) with small leak.
• UP addressed this.



After-Event Issues

- Fly-by-night contractors, roofers.
 - PD, Inspections, Code Enforcement -Monitored
 - Implemented vehicle placards.
 - Required city/state contractor license.
 - Local contractors assisted in monitoring unlicensed.
- Hauling of debris and vegetation to landfills.
 - DEQ authorized opening of Strawfloor pit for vegetation and "city" construction debris.
 - Private construction debris Legacy landfill





Consideration

- Some tornado debris hasn't been picked up.
- Some property owners haven't started reconstruction. Reasons:
 - Waiting list for contractor.
 - Sale to contractors/developers.
 - Yet to settle with insurance.
 - Abandoned the property.
- Some pose safety threat and are blight to adjacent property owners.

Proposal


- After <u>Nov. 1</u>, City will impose normal permit fees.
- Staff to notify property owners (with damage) that have NOT yet applied for a building permit:
 - Must get a building permit prior to <u>Dec. 1</u>.
 - If they don't (and can't document an acceptable reason), city will start boarding ordinance and/or condemnation process.
 - Building permit lasts for six months. (Can renew.)
- For property owners with debris:
 - City is now enforcing codes.





