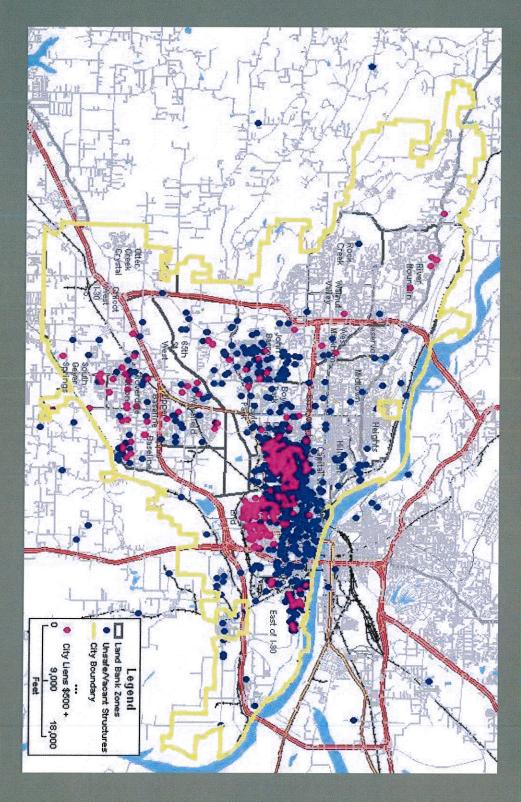

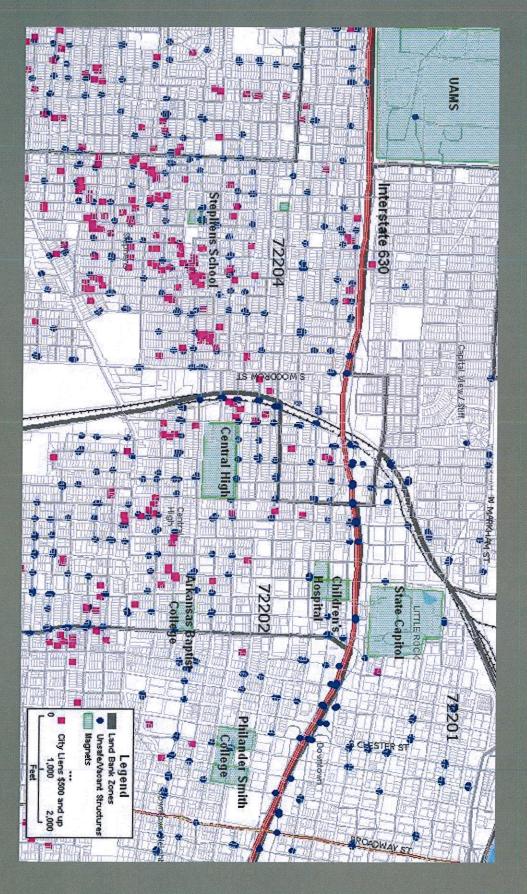
## LBC looked at "proxies" for blight

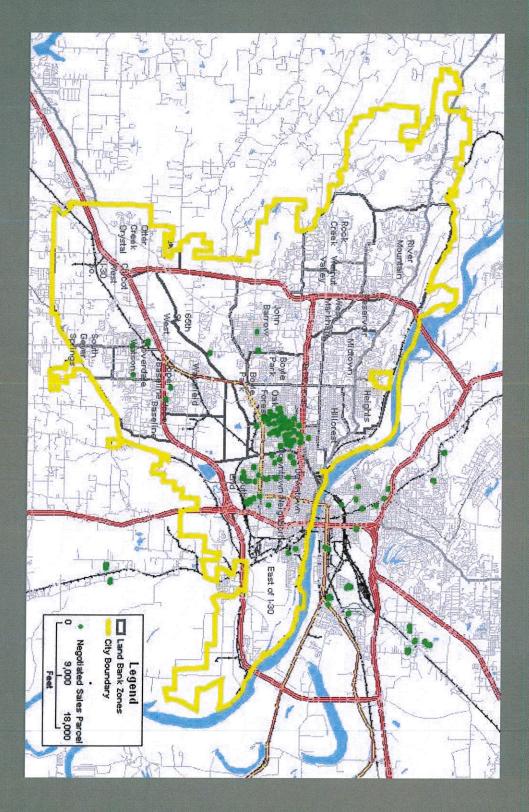

### City View – Parcels on SLC Negotiated Sales List The Little Rock Land Bank Commission



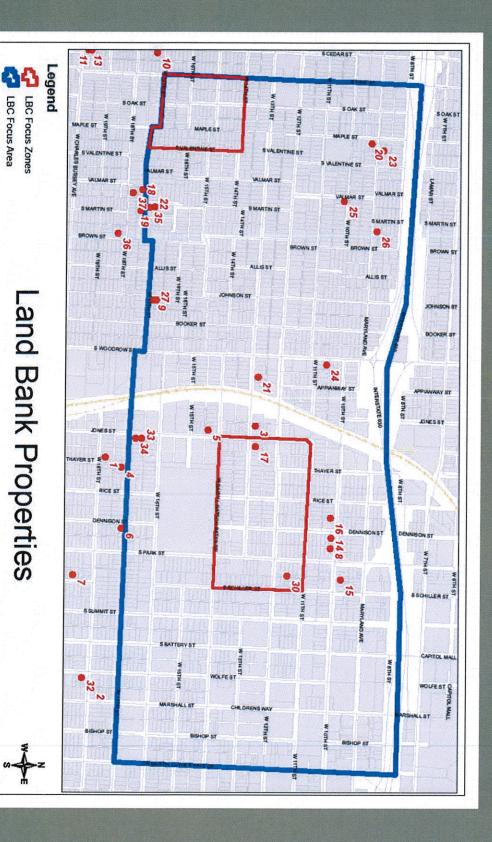
